What has changed?

Urbanization

- more children grow up in urban areas
- no "wild spots" to play without supervision

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What has changed?

Outdoor laws and restrictions:

- No camping
- No campfire
- No fishing
- No playing
- No sledging
- No climbing trees

Space to play freely and gain experiences is sparse!



What has changed?

Parents: - fear of injuries → overprotection (helmets for kids e.t.c.) - fear of kidnapping, traffic, wild animals... Overprotective parents: kids are NOT allowed to play outside on their own

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What has changed?

School: more full time schools Parents: fully planned indoor free time schedule (sports, music, tutoring lessons...)

No time for outdoor activities



What has changed?

Full time media entertainment: TV, internet, computer, tablet, PC, smart phone, playstation etc.

Children spend a lot of their free time in front of a screen



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Youth Report Nature

Documenting the changing relationship between young people and nature in Germany is the focus of this report.

- All types of schools: Hauptschule (lowest graduation), Real-/Geamtschule, Gymnasium (highest graduation)


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


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






















Summary

Most students...

...live near the woods.

... are more often in the woods than expected.

...have little experience with nature.

...know little about nature.

Knowledge is deteriorating and experience is less frequent.

Students have gained most of their knowledge about nature in school.
